Young Panthers stay in match with Maynard

BARRE-Freshmen and sophomores are normally members of a junior varsity team at most high schools. That's not the case for the boys' soccer team at Quabbin Regional High School.

There are a total of 13 sophomores and freshmen listed on the Panthers varsity roster and it has been a learning experience for them this fall.

Quabbin was trailing, 3-0, against Mid-Wach C League rival Maynard five minutes into the second half.

The young Panthers managed to close the gap to 3-2, but the Tigers scored a pair of late goals, and they headed home with a 5-2 victory, last Thursday afternoon.

"I saw a lot of positive things in today's game despite the outcome," said Quabbin head coach Ryan Wine. "We're a young team and I just want my players to keep improving in every game that we play this season."

Quabbin, who lost to Maynard, 6-1, at the beginning of the regular season, had a 1-9-1 overall record following the home loss. The Panthers only victory was a 1-0 home shutout versus Tahanto Regional on September 12. They also played a 3-3 tie at Littleton 14 days later.

There are only two seniors listed on the Quabbin varsity roster. One of them is Ethan Salvadore. The other senior is Kevin Boles, who's sidelined with an ankle injury that he suffered during a summer league game.

"Ethan is a strong kid and we're happy that he's a member of our soccer team this year," said Wine, who graduated from Quabbin Regional in 2012. "Kevin suffered an ankle injured in a summer league game and he's probably out for the season.

We really do miss him a lot. The Panthers only junior is Collin

Lindley, who's a starting defender. Salvadore, Boles, and Lindley are

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also captains, along with sophomore James Cook.

Wine made a couple of changes during the game against the Tigers (7-1-3). He moved sophomore Nathan Cruz, who's a starting defender, to a midfield position. Cook was moved to a wing position.

"Nathan is a physical type of a player and having him in the middle makes a difference against good teams like Maynard," Wine said. "We also switched (sophomore) Logan Bruley to defense. We just want to keep the players positive."

Two eighth graders also saw action in a varsity soccer game for the first time since Wine has been coaching the team. They are Eli Fox and Cavin Rivard, who were the first two players off the Panthers bench.

This is the first time we've played eighth graders since I've been the varsity coach," Wine said. "I thought they played very well."

Maynard took a 1-0 lead on a header by senior Miller Norris following a long throw-in from the left sideline from junior Alexander Mendez during the sixth minute of the opening half.

Nine minutes later, junior Anuar Alvarez gave the visiting team a 2-0 advantage on a chip shot over Quabbin sophomore Alijah Flint following a corner kick. Flint finished the home match with ten saves.

"Alijah is averaging between ten and twelve saves per game," Wine said. "He's kept us in a lot of games this season. He's a very good goalie."

The Tigers, who held a 2-0 halftime lead, scored another goal five minutes into the second half on a rebound shot by freshman Abraham Brown.
